

FIRE DAMAGES 20 METER BAND

The phone portion of the 20 meter band was hit by a freak fire last week that destroyed over 10 kilohertz, according to FCC special frequency engineer, Marvin Larpsnogg. Apparently the fire originated on about 14.280 megahertz following an unusually long series of QSOs by an undetermined number of California stations running very high power and extreme modulation compression. Several AØ carriers were observed at the same time and may have contributed to starting the blaze. "We had a hell of a time putting the fire out," said Larpsnogg. "Shutting down the propagation generators did no good at all. The fire just spread up and down the band," he went on, "so we had to turn off all the HF ham bands from 40 through 10 meters to smother the flames." Finally, after nearly three hours, the FCC had the fire under control. Most HF bands were back to normal use the next day; however, 20 meters will be closed for several weeks while the frequencies are being refurbished. When notified of the fire, the League of Radio Relaying Americans cancelled all 20 meter DX contests until further notice. According to League spokesperson Sandy Ampersand, the 20 meter fire was the worst such incident since the famed 5 meter holocaust completely wiped out that band for all time 40 years ago.



R9AAI has been operating extremely well lately, I'm glad to report. We had a minor problem with the ID'er trying to play the role of a remote temperature transmitter for a while. Aside from solving that problem and doing a little preventative maintenance, I've been free to tend to other aspects of Repeaterdom.

Most of you have heard (or not heard-the interference, that is) that the Lake Geneva group has moved off 146.37/.97. Our thanks go to Erling Gruel, Frequency Coordinator for the Wisconsin Association Of Repeaters. Lake Geneva is now on 144.69/145.29 and I'm told that they are using carrier access.


Since Lake Geneva moved off 146.97, a poll was taken on one of the Tuesday nets. The general opinion was that we should try operating the repeater on carrier access. The results of a test period on carrier access were disappointing. We had extensive interference from Michigan repeater systems. We are now back on tone access, and will stay this way until we install the new control system. The The new equipment will allow remote control switching of tone/carrier access, among many other items. The ARRL Repeater Directory and W.A.R. listings should be updated to show our tone access frequencies (2250hz and T.T.3) for those who are travelling through our area.

The Tuesday night Repeater Let has been quite active lately with an average of 15 check-ins per week. I've finally talked several members into taking Net Control and hope to have a few more soon. The Net runs at 2000 HRS local time and we'll all be listening for you.

We are planning to change the AUTOPATCH access code soon for 1981. Paid-up members will receive cards showing the new access code at the next meeting. The access code will change in late February, so, get your dues up to date!
