RALPHIE'S TELECOMPUTING CORNER [Mr. Wizard of OZRAD]

One of the tasks which crops up frequently when entering call letters into a computer program (i.e. for Sweepstakes, Field Day, or What-have-you) is a verification routine, which will determine whether the data entered represents a valid call. This routine must be very fast, since it will be called frequently, and must, so far as possible, be able to ferret out all occurences of misspellings, transpositions, erroneous inclusions, and just plain jamming-of-the-fingers-between-the-keys. In addition, it would be nice if the routine would delete leading and trailing blanks (so that proper comparisons can be made for "dupe-ing," and would assign a variable to the "call area" for possible use by other subroutines (it should also not be fooled by "slash-portable" entries). Following is my candidate for the fastest, most inclusive verification routine -- please contact WA9UDZ if you have one which is superior:

I should note that this routine will cause an entry to 'fail' (i.e. the flag will be set to 1) if a call is specified outside of the United States and Canada. If you wish to be able to enter other foreign calls, add all prefixes to be permitted to line # 630. A 'O' entry for Flag 'X' denotes a proper call, and the variable 'Q' contains the call area of the entry (but contains a "10" if the call is illegal). This program was written for the APPLE, but is readily adaptable to other computers.

Security room available for equipment storage. Message format discussed.



SCHEMATIC OF THE MONTH by W9WQ

Picked this one up in browsing thru back issues of OST. constant-current battery charging idea proposed by AE9G in February 1980 QST on Page 33. As can be seen from the schematic, it is quite simple. The use of the capacitor makes it quite efficient. The ONE MICROFARAD shown is about right for the 40 mil rate for AA NICADS; other rates can be had with larger or smaller capacitors. Diode PIV should be 200 volts or better. Also, disconnect charger from the line when inserting or removing battery.
