DX'ing

As I write this there is a big pile up on 706T on 17 Meters. 7O is Yemen and there have not been any operators there in many years, so a lot of DXers need this country badly. I have only worked it twice, in 1990 and 2000. There are a number of reasons a country can be rare, and one of them is that the government does not permit amateur radio operations. Generally these are authoritarian governments worried about being overthrown. To their point of view the only reason a private people would have radio equipment was because they were spies. There was an additional problem in some African countries because the local language didn't even have a word for "hobby". How do you explain to a military dictator that you like to talk on the radio as a hobby?

China (BY) had been off the air for decades until the mid 1980's. With a growing middle class, recognition that hams develop technical skills along with general loosening of control, there are now a lot of BY stations on the air. Maybe the only tough part of working them is that propagation has not been good to that part of the world since the last sunspot peak. Albania was another rare one until the early 1990's when a group of hams, primarily European, made many trips and presentations the government there and convinced them that amateur radio was a resource. They set up training at technical colleges and donated equipment. After that ZA stations were fairly common.

Probably the toughest nut to crack is North Korea. Ham radio was prohibited, along with any other forms of communication to the outside world when the country was split in two after WWII. For a couple of years around 2002 a foreign aid worker from Eastern Europe was allowed to operate, and was my one and only P5 contact. Soon afterwards he was ordered to the police station and was told he had 24 hours to leave the country. A few days later it became apparent what happened. North Korea was found to be cheating on its nuclear program. President Bush canceled the aid to the country that was contingent on full inspections of the nuclear program. The response was expelling foreigners. It was hoped with a new leader that things might loosen up, but with their recent missile test and a probable upcoming atomic test that does not seem likely. It is interesting how international politics have such a big effect on our hobby.

Yemen is of course in a volatile part of the world. I'm not sure why this operation has been approved. It is a DXpedition of mostly Russian hams with a few Americans, a Mongolian and a Serbian ham. Usually when there is a big DXpedition to a rare country the word gets out months before. This one was much different. Rumors came out only a day or so before they were on the air.

So, how do you find out about these things? In the past you could subscribe to weekly DX newsletters by mail. By the time you got the info, it could be a couple of weeks old. Of course the Internet has changed all that. There are a number of DX newsletters. Two free ones are:

The OPDX bulletin by KB8NW comes out every Sunday evening. <http://www.papays.com/opdx.html>

The ARRL has their DX bulletins on Thursday evenings that they transmit on the air. You can also subscribe for email versions. ARRL members can just log in at www.arrl.org and go to their profile page and select what email newsletters, bulletins, etc. they want. Non-ARRL members can get the ARRL bulletins emailed too. Check the ARRL website.

The Yemen operation is scheduled to go through May 15. By the time you read this the pile ups should be down some and you should have a chance to nab a rare one that some serious DXers have been waiting a long time.

No. 170: Major Geeks – *Simply the Best There Is*

I have visited many a website over the years, looking for good software to make my computing life easier. Indeed, I still have bookmarks to a few, though I don't visit them much at all anymore. Why? Simply because there is one site that stands out above all others. Of course, I am talking about majorgeeks.com, the best there is on the web for safe software.

I urge you to take a look at the site, so you can easily find solutions when problems pop up. Once there, look at the panel on the right and click on **NEW? START HERE**. You will be presented with a short video that tells you how to use the site, along with some text that tells you about the site and why it is heads and shoulders above the others. Next, click on **TOP FREEWARE PICKS**, the second item in the panel on the right. This is a relatively new section on the site that lists just what it says, in several categories shown below. The number in parentheses is the number of suggestions in that category at the time this

article was written. Of course, as new software is written and evaluated, both the titles and numbers may change. Note also that the software packages are listed in order of preference. What a time saver! And, realize that these are the pick of the pick, from nearly 10,000 files on the site. Sweet!

Minutes– April 11th, 2012

President Ken Boston, W9GA, called the meeting to order at 7:30 p.m. Members present then introduced themselves.

Announcements>Show-and-Tell:

Tom Ruhlmann, W9IPR, returning snowbird from Florida, commented on the efforts of the Civil Air Patrol in Lakeland, FL to get youngsters interested in ham radio. He also mentioned that he too is the proud owner of the VX-1, tiny, dual band HT that Ed Rate, AA9W has highlighted in previous show-and-tell periods. Tom also noted that due to a scheduling conflict, he will be unable to go to the Dayton Hamvention in May. As in past years, Tom was intending to tow a small, lightweight trailer filled with ORC Scholarship Fund ham radio gear to the Hamvention swapfest. But since he is not going, he asked if there was another member who'd be willing to tow the lightweight trailer (estimated 600 lbs) with their car or truck to the Hamvention. Program:

Nels Harvey, WA9JOB, gave a presentation titled “Broadcast Radio, Wind Turbines, and Whatever” where he discussed the various methods radio broadcasters use to avoid having their signals interfere with other stations. He also discussed how wind turbines can interfere with radio broadcast signals and the methods currently being used to “detune” them to prevent this interference.

Auction:

Stan Kaplan, WB9RQR, played the role of auctioneer once again during the meeting. Proceeds, as usual, go to the club’s scholarship fund.

Business Meeting:

President’s report: Ken mentioned that the June meeting will focus on the Club’s plans for Field Day. Stan Kaplan, WB9RQR, asked that members who are currently in possession of one of the Club’s Field Day laptops to return the laptop at the May meeting so he can prepare them for Field Day use.

Ken conducted the Question and Answer session, which is designed to answer questions, posed by newbie hams/new club members. Tom Ruhlmann, W9IPR, asked if a club member might have expertise in one or more of the newer VHF/UHF modes, and in particular Echolink, and would be willing to give a presentation about it to the club. Tom noted that such modes are open to new Technician hams and it might be helpful for new hams to learn about these modes. Tom has listened to Echolink to monitor a 2m train net, and has found it interesting, though he doesn’t consider himself an expert to make a presentation on it. No members expressed expertise or interest in presenting on Echolink, though it was noted that there is a useful website about Echolink at www.echolink.org.

1st VP Report: none

2nd VP Report: Tom Nawrot, AA9XK, filled in for 2nd VP Brian Skrentny, N9LOO, re: the upcoming May ORC Swapfest. He mentioned that there will be a Friday set-up. Members who will be helping out at the Swapfest should arrive at 6 am Saturday.

Repeater VP Report: Tom Trethewey, KC9ONY, noted that all repeaters have been working over the past month. The Germantown site is now back up. As an aside, Tom also mentioned that there will be a statewide Tornado drill on April 19th, at 1 pm, conducted by the National Weather Service. The test watch will be broadcast on NOAA Weather Radio.

Secretary’s Report/Minutes: Jim Albrinck, K9QLP, requested a correction to last month’s minutes to reflect the fact that John Schrader, W9NRG, will act as club liaison with the Cedarburg Fire Dept., and not the Grafton Fire Dept., for the ORC fall swapfest at Fireman’s park. A motion to accept the minutes with this change to the last newsletter was then made by Tom Ruhlmann, W9IPR. Stan Kaplan, W9RQR, seconded the motion and the motion passed.

Treasurer’s Report: Dave Barrow, N9UNR, apologized for not being able to get the treasurer’s report into the April newsletter. He did however; send the profit/loss report to all members via email. Dave provided a brief summary of the Club’s finances. He also noted that the club spent \$400 (approved by the

Board) to repair the crank-up Field Day antenna that broke and crashed to ground at last year's Field Day. Dave commended Nels Harvey, WA9JOB, for spearheading the repair effort and getting the antenna expertly repaired at such a reasonable cost.

Ken Boston, W9GA, informed the club that there will be an ORC Board meeting scheduled soon where Dave will discuss the conversion of the club's books over to QuickBooks. Several members have had questions about the conversion process from the previous Excel-based accounting system to the QuickBooks system and how a number of items are being accounted for. Ken will let the membership know the date and time of the meeting via the re-mailer system. All interested members are encouraged to attend.

Kent Christiansen, N9WH, reported that the audit committee recently completed the audit of the Club's 2011 books. All was found to be good order.

Bill Howe, KA9WRL, made a motion to accept the treasurer's report. Art Davidson, KC9PXR, seconded the motion and the motion passed.

Old/New Business:

Tom Ruhlmann, W9IPR, mentioned that Opportunity Days is May 4 at Parkview Elementary School. Tom and Bill Howe, KA9WRL, participate in this event each year, demonstrating ham radio to the students at the school. Tom and Bill noted that their demo sessions fill up quickly and the kids are very enthusiastic, especially about sending Morse code.

Adjournment:

Kent Christiansen, N9WH, moved and Stan Kaplan, WB9RQR seconded the motion to adjourn the meeting.

At 9:20 p.m. the meeting was adjourned.
